The Director of Music was Jem Lowther and the service was sung by members of The Choirs of All Saints'. The organist was Laurence Caldecote.

The service was formed of familiar prayers and music and designed to help a grateful nation pay their respects. The Readings and Hymns focused on the meaning of Christian life, and the hope that exists for all of us in death, for there shall we truly find God.

Tributes were offered from the Faith Leaders of Northamptonshire.

The final blessing was given by the Assistant Bishop of Peterborough followed by THE NATIONAL ANTHEM.
